Secure: When Life Hits Hard 1 Peter 1:1-12

1.You Must Remember This You live near the coast. The National weather service is warning that a Category 5 hurricane is headed your way.

Difficult times come into your everyday life like a hurricane. When they do, we have to be able to do more than flee to higher ground or hide behind some boarded-up windows. There might come a few blue-sky seasons in life where things seem to be going well and everything is falling perfectly in place. But for most of life we are about to go into a trial, will already be in a trial, or will have just come out of a trial. Hurricanes vary in intensity from a Category 1 (least intense) to a Category 5 (most intense). Trials and hard times also vary in intensity.

Peter wrote this letter to people who were starting to feel the pain of persecution. They apparently were struggling to understand why they were going through these difficulties or what they should do about them. We do the same thing—"Why is this happening to me?" "When will this end?" "Am I ever going to get through this?" "What should I do?" When life hits like a hurricane, we don't need some Christian cliché or bumper sticker theology. We need our roots dug down deep into the rich soil of God's Word to gain the nutrients that we need. When the retirement account evaporates; when the company goes bankrupt; when the doctor says radical treatment is necessary; when the spouse says it's over; when the bottom falls out; we need to remember 1 Peter 1:1-12.

If you are a follower of Christ, who does Peter say you are in 1 Peter 1:1-2? "strangers"- aliens, exiles, foreigners

Peter started off by addressing his audience as exiles or temporary residents. He repeated the idea again in 2:11. His word choice reminded them that they were not in home territory. Some translations use "aliens" or "strangers" to render the Greek word. The designation recalled the Jews as they had been driven out of Israel to live in foreign lands, first in Egypt then in Babylon. Peter here used that designation for the church. It's the idea of remembering we don't belong here. This is not our permanent home. The follower of Christ marches to the beat of a different drummer and must never fall into step with this world

Elect according to the foreknowledge of God the Father chosen twice (1) grace to all (2) foreknown through sanctification of the Spirit—set apart to God by the work of the Spirit unto obedience and sprinkling of the blood of Jesus Christ

I Cor 6: 11 And such were some of you: but ye are washed, but ye are sanctified, but ye are justified in the name of the Lord Jesus, and by the Spirit of our God.

7. What is our role in this world?

When you are not from a country, you can either be in that country as an <u>immigrant</u> or a <u>tourist</u>. An immigrant makes the new country his home. A large number of Christians live this way. All their focus is down here. All their resources (time, influence, money, etc.) go for things that won't last. Other Christians act like tourists. Tourists are people who don't really get involved in the country they are visiting. They enjoy the attractions but stay somewhat separated from the native population. A lot of churches/Christians act like this. Instead of living on mission and involving themselves in their communities, they go from one church event to the next and have little impact for the kingdom.

God calls believers to plant their lives here, while realizing their permanent home is not here. (See Phil. 3:20; Heb. 11:10.) First Peter 2 (as well as other places such as 2 Cor. 5:20 and Eph. 6:20) encourages us to think like an <u>ambassador</u>. An ambassador is someone sent from one country with a mission to another country.

What values and decisions would change...

8. Ambassadors have trials too.

Considering the trials the believers were experiencing because they followed Jesus, why would Peter praise God rather than express sympathy for them?

Our inheritance is:

imperishable – that is, unable to be corrupted or defiled undefiled – unpolluted, unstained, unspoiled, pure unfading – something that never wears out but retains its luster kept – the idea of being guarded and protected by God

Contrast the world's hope with biblical hope

fiery trials cause impure attitudes and beliefs to rise to the surface in our lives. That's when God can work repentance and cleansing in our lives.

C) Glorify God

believers can bring God glory by the way they handle trials

Ro 11:29 For the gifts and calling of God are without repentance.

All were chosen in Christ

Eph 1:4 According as he hath chosen us <u>in Him</u> before the foundation of the world, that we should be holy and without blame before him in love:

Joh 1:29...Behold the Lamb of God, which taketh away the sin of the world.

Isa 53: 6 All we like sheep have gone astray; we have turned every one to his own way; and the LORD hath laid on him the iniquity of us all.

There are none who are specifically appointed by God to be cursed

There are many who appoint themselves to condemnation by rejecting God's offer of salvation

Heb 10:38 Now the just shall live by faith: but if any man draw back, my soul shall have no pleasure in him.

1Co 16:22 If any man love not the Lord Jesus Christ, let him be Anathema Maranatha.

John 3: 18 He that believeth on him is not condemned: but he that believeth not is condemned already, because he hath not believed in the name of the only begotten Son of God.

Those which He foreknew He secured

II Thes 2:13 But we are bound to give thanks alway to God for you, **brethren beloved of the Lord**, because God hath from the beginning chosen you to salvation through sanctification of the Spirit and belief of the truth:

This narrower group is doubly secured based on God's fore knowledge

(God knows everyone before they exist in time- He knows the choices they will make)

Rom 8: 29 For whom he did <u>foreknow</u> (*proginosko*), he also did predestinate to be conformed to the image of his Son, that he might be the firstborn among many brethren

I Pet 1: 2 Elect according to the <u>foreknowledge</u> (*prognosis*) of God the Father, through sanctification of the Spirit, unto obedience and sprinkling of the blood of Jesus Christ: Grace unto you, and peace, be multiplied.
